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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Pakistan's economy maintained its stabilization momentum during FY2025-26 despite challenges from early-year floods, escalating Middle East tensions, and regional uncertainties. Average inflation was recorded at 7.1% which remained within the target of 7.5%. Workers' remittances reached \$41.6 billion, surpassing the target of \$39.4 billion; services exports recorded robust growth, and FBR tax collection increased to Rs. 13 trillion during FY2025-26. Development spending remained focused on priority sectors throughout the year. CDWP met 21 times during the year and considered 330 agenda items, approving 192 projects and recommending 96 to ECNEC for consideration. Cost rationalization measures improved PSDP resource utilization and generated savings of Rs. 12.62 billion, enhancing the efficiency of development spending. The approved development portfolio is expected to create around 289,153 direct and 424,052 indirect employment opportunities during FY 2025-26, contributing to economic growth. The Ministry also enhanced implementation oversight through regular monitoring and evaluation, advanced strategic initiatives across various sectors, and expanded international development partnerships. Furthermore, the Ministry successfully led the preparation of the Annual Plan 2026-27, finalized the macroeconomic framework, organized APCC meeting, and subsequently secured approval from the NEC for growth targets and the National Development outlay of Rs. 3,675 billion. Going forward, the focus shall remain on consolidating economic gains and advancing reforms to support resilient, inclusive, and sustainable economic growth.

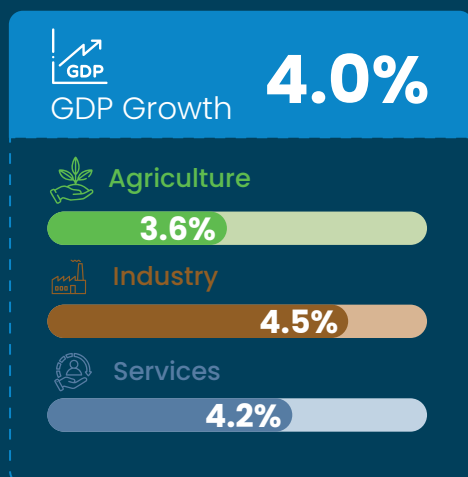

- During FY 2025-26 Pakistan economy demonstrated notable stabilization through prudent macroeconomic management and improved economic fundamentals despite global and domestic economic challenges.
- During FY 2025-26, GDP growth estimated at 3.7% compared to 3.2% last year. The growth was mainly driven by improved performance in the agriculture and services sectors, which expanded by 2.9% and 4.1% respectively, while industrial growth moderated to 3.5% from 5.6% last year.
- Large-Scale Manufacturing (LSM) recorded a growth of 5.8% during Jul-May FY2025-26, compared to a contraction of 1.12% during the corresponding period of last year, reflecting a significant improvement in industrial activity. The growth was broad-based, led by Automobiles (58.8%), Electrical Equipment (13.5%), Tobacco (12.8%), Food (7.8%), Non-Metallic Mineral Products (6.3%), Beverages (5.4%), Wearing Apparel (7.3%) etc., contributing to the overall expansion of the manufacturing sector.
- Sales and production of commercial vehicles and tractors recorded robust growth during FY 2025-26. Tractors production and sales increased by 3.6% and 9.6% respectively, while the production of two/three-wheeler increased by 30.4% and its sales rose by 28.9%, reflecting stronger demand from the agriculture and transport sectors alongside improving manufacturing activity.
- Cement sector performance improved during FY2025-26, with total dispatches increased by 7.2% to 50.5 million tons from 47.1 million tons in FY2024-25. The growth was driven by a 9.5% increase in domestic sales, which rose to 41.5 million tons, while exports declined slightly by 2.2% to 9.0 million tons. In June 2026, total cement dispatches increased by 18.4% year-on-year to 4.3 million tons from 3.6 million tons in June 2025, indicating positive momentum in construction activity and domestic demand.
- Average inflation remained contained at 7.1% during FY2025-26, staying within the annual target of 7.5%. Inflationary pressures eased towards the end of the FY 2025-26, with YoY inflation declining to 11.1% in June 2026 from 11.7% in May 2026.
- The external sector exhibited mixed trends, while the services sector remained resilient. Services exports increased by 18.7%, led by ICT services, particularly computer services, along with other business services. Despite a 5.7% increase in services imports, the services trade deficit narrowed by 33.3%.
- The exports of goods and services during FY2025-26 stood at \$40.9 billion, reflecting an increase of 0.2% over the previous fiscal year. In June 2026, exports (G&S) recorded a strong YoY growth of 8.0%, rising to \$3.5 billion from \$3.3 billion in the corresponding month of the previous year. However, export of goods recorded at \$30.8 billion in FY2025-26 weighed down by 4.6% due to decrease in food exports (25%), although textile exports remained resilient with positive growth of 1.9%. On the import side, stronger domestic demand and improving industrial activity led to higher import recorded at \$64.5 billion (9%) due to higher imports of machinery, transport equipment, electrical machinery, and industrial raw materials.
- Workers' remittances increased by 8.6% to \$41.6 billion during FY2025-26, surpassing the annual target of \$39.4 billion providing critical support to the external account, driven by exchange rate stability, higher overseas employment, and improved economic conditions in host and destination countries.
- Fiscal performance remained robust, with fiscal consolidation supported by improved revenue mobilization and prudent expenditure management. FBR tax collection increased by 10.8% to Rs. 13 trillion during FY2025-26.

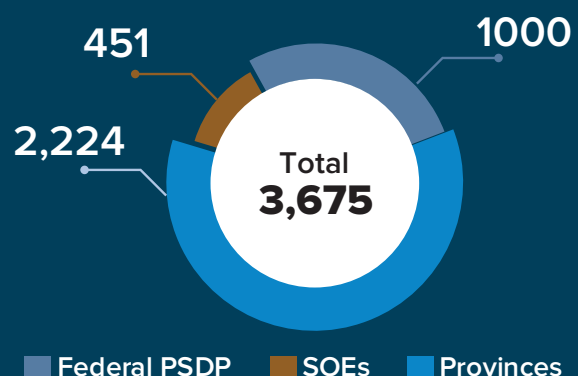
Annual Plan 2026-27: Macroeconomic Framework & Development Priorities



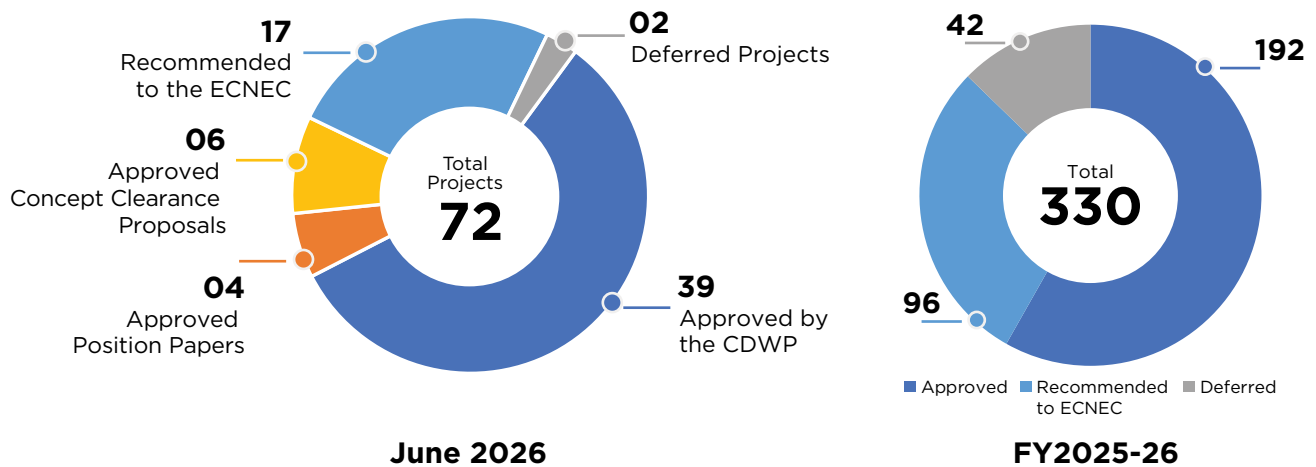
The preparation of the Annual Plan 2026-27 reflects the Ministry of Planning, Development and Special Initiatives' central role in setting out the strategic outlook for FY2026-27. It translates national development priorities into a structured program of investment, reform, and sectoral action. On 1 June 2026, the Annual Plan Coordination Committee (APCC), chaired by the Federal Minister for Planning considered the Annual Plan 2026-27 and recommended the strategic priorities and development targets, including GDP growth of 4.0% and National Development Outlay of Rs.3,675 billion. Subsequently, the National Economic Council (NEC) approved the Annual Plan 2026-27.

DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

In the month of June 2026, three (03) meetings of the CDWP were convened and the forum considered a total of seventy-two (72) agenda items, comprising fifty-eight (58) projects, seven (07) position papers, six (06) concept clearance proposals, and one (01) policy paper. Out of these, thirty-nine (39) projects, four (04) position papers, and six (06) concept clearance proposals were approved by the CDWP. Seventeen (17) projects and three (03) position papers, and one (01) policy paper were recommended to ECNEC. While two (02) projects were deferred for further review. Details at Annex-II.

During FY2025-26, the CDWP forum convened 21 meetings under the chairmanship of DCPC to review development proposals submitted by federal ministries and provincial governments. The forum considered 330 agenda items, of which 192 items were approved, 96 were recommended for ECNEC consideration and 42 were deferred for further review.

A detailed sector-wise breakdown of the agenda items for the month of June 2026 is given below:



Agriculture & Food Sector

CDWP recommended one (01) project worth Rs. 17,000.0 million to ECNEC to strengthen Pakistan's agriculture sector through research, innovation, and sustainable value chain development.



Education & Training Sector

CDWP approved five (05) projects worth Rs. 1,163.4 million to strengthen undergraduate education through improved academic infrastructure. The forum also agreed to establish a modern multipurpose sports and community hall.



Fuel Sector

CDWP approved one (01) project worth Rs. 1,440.0 million to enhance indigenous uranium reserves and strengthen long-term nuclear fuel security.



Devolution & Area Development Sector

CDWP recommended one (01) project worth Rs. 32,075.1 million to ECNEC to reduce poverty and improve rural livelihoods in 10 districts of southern and western Punjab through expanded social protection coverage.



Governance Sector

The forum approved two (02) position papers focusing on developing a credible investment pipeline, strengthening infrastructure financing, and enhancing the institutional capacity of the MoPDSI.



Health Sector

CDWP approved one (01) project worth Rs. 5,483.3 million to strengthen diagnostic services at DHQ and Teaching Hospitals in AJ&K through the provision of essential medical equipment.



Higher Education Sector

CDWP approved one (01) project worth Rs. 3,166.6 million to establish modern E-Sports Arenas and Training Centers in selected Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), promoting youth skills development and the growth of Pakistan's digital economy.



Information Technology Sector

CDWP approved four (04) projects worth Rs. 9,244.0 million to strengthen digital governance, national security, and IT infrastructure. It also recommended four (04) projects worth Rs. 371,203.4 million to ECNEC for AI, satellite communication, land administration, and digital transformation initiatives.



Physical Planning & Housing Sector

CDWP approved thirteen (13) projects worth Rs. 23,680.3 million and recommended two (02) projects worth Rs. 69,906.0 million to ECNEC to strengthen national security, intelligence infrastructure, Frontier Corps facilities, and election administration across KP, Sindh, Balochistan, and GB.



Power Sector

CDWP approved six (06) projects worth Rs. 20,738.4 million to strengthen power distribution systems through smart monitoring technologies. It also recommended four (04) projects worth Rs. 343,016.1 million to ECNEC for modernizing the national power network.



Science & Technology Sector

CDWP approved three (03) projects worth Rs. 5,651.4 million to strengthen national capacity in defense technologies, nuclear medicine, and aerospace workforce development.



Transport and Communications Sector

CDWP approved five (05) projects worth Rs. 8,517.9 million to improve road connectivity, transport infrastructure, and coastal facilities, enhancing mobility, regional accessibility, maritime security, and fisheries management. It also recommended three (03) projects worth Rs. 309,840.1 million to ECNEC for strengthening the country's road, rail, bridge, motorway, and mass transit networks.



Water Resources Sector

CDWP recommended two (02) projects worth Rs. 79,295.9 million to ECNEC to strengthen water resource management and irrigation infrastructure in Punjab and Balochistan through canal development and rehabilitation, improving irrigation efficiency, agricultural productivity, and climate resilience.

COST RATIONALIZATION (FY2025 – 26)

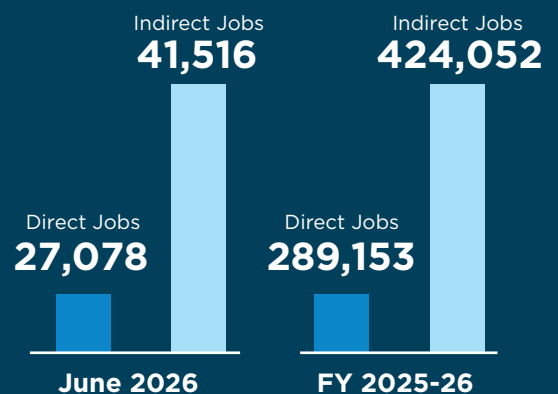
Focusing on efficient utilization of public resources and after extensive scrutiny, non-essential components were eliminated to ensure optimal value for public investment. The intervention has strengthened the efficiency in processing allocation of scarce national resources while demonstrating the Government's firm commitment to results-driven and impact-oriented development. Owing to these efforts, savings amounting to Rs 565.941 million were secured during June, bringing cumulative savings to Rs 12.62 billion for FY2025-26.

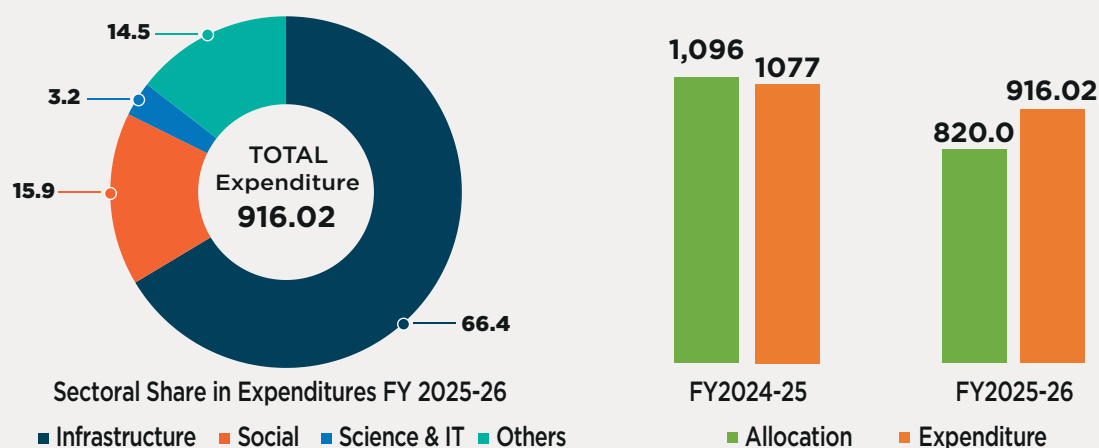
EMPLOYMENT GENERATION

Public investment remains a key driver of economic growth, infrastructure development, and employment generation. The development portfolio approved during June 2026 alone is expected to provide employment opportunities for 27,078 direct and 41,516 indirect workers across key sectors, including Information Technology, Power, Water Resources, Transport, Health, Education, Housing, Science & Technology, and Poverty Alleviation. The portfolio reflects the Government's commitment to inclusive, sustainable, and employment-oriented development.

During FY2025-26, a review of the development portfolio indicates an estimated employment generation of 289,153 direct and 424,052 indirect jobs.



DEVELOPMENT SPENDING (Rs. in Billion)

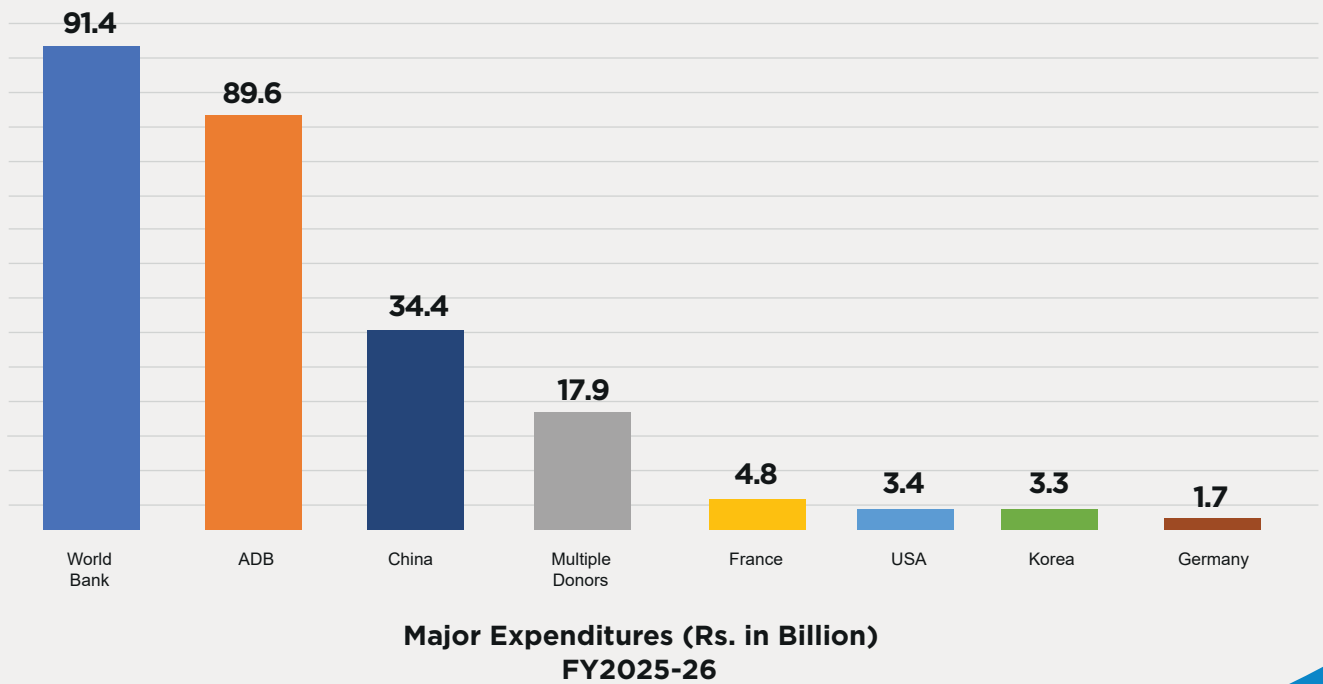


During FY 2025-26, Ministries/Divisions have reported expenditure of Rs. 916.02 billion in the SAP system. The exceeded utilization owes to increased Rupee cover expenditure of foreign funded projects, especially by the third party payments in the projects of Infrastructure, Health & Nutrition and Governance. Moreover, the counterpart share by the Govt. of Sindh for the railways also contributed to increased expenditures. Detail of allocations and expenditures across sectors are presented below:

FOREIGN FUNDED PROJECTS

The PSDP portfolio includes 86 foreign-funded projects, of which 15 projects are fully foreign-funded and the remaining 61 are implemented with local counterpart funding. For FY2025-26, a rupee cover of Rs. 229 billion was allocated for these projects. The Ministry authorized one-line releases to all sponsoring Ministries and Divisions in line with quarterly ceilings set by the Finance Division under the development budget release strategy. PAOs were empowered to release and sanction funds for both foreign aid and local components based on each project's requirements. According to SAP records, Ministries and Divisions have recorded an expenditure of Rs. 246.8 billion against the allocated rupee cover.



Salient Features of the PDSP 2026-27

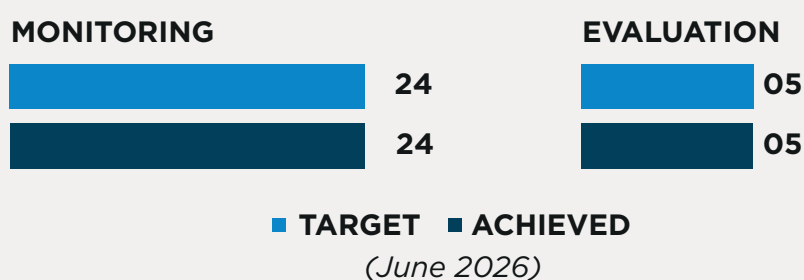
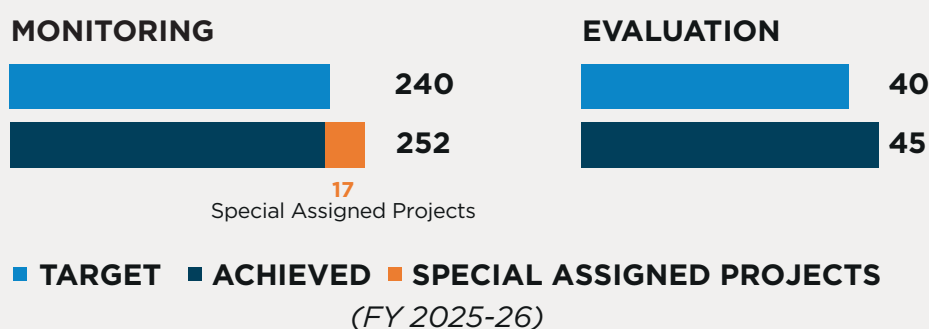


- The PSDP 2026-27 has been approved by the National Economic Council (NEC) on 10th June 2026, with a total allocation of Rs. 1,000 billion, including Rs. 255 billion as rupee cover for foreign-funded projects.
- The PSDP Resource allocation is aligned with "URAAN Pakistan" - 5Es-based National Economic Transformation Plan. In fund allocation, priority has been given to mega /core projects of national significance, foreign-aided schemes, and those near completion.
- To ensure timely completion under the PSDP 2026-27, over 97% of resources are earmarked for ongoing projects.
- Priority has been given to fastly moving projects (to be completed within next 2-3 years) to reap the benefits on completion.
- Given the resource constraints, new projects had been discouraged except for those that focus on productivity enhancement & are aligned with URAAN Pakistan
- Provincial nature projects have been discouraged except for those located in least developed areas as per policy approved by the NEC.
- Over 60% of the PSDP resources have been allocated to infrastructure sector, with major shares to Transport and Communication (36%), Water Resources (8%), Energy (12%), and Physical Planning & Housing (5%).
- The social sector received 18%, covering Health, Higher Education, SDGs, and related projects.
- Adequate allocations have been earmarked Science and Technology, IT, Governance, Industries & Production, and other sectors to boost the economy.
- Special emphasis has been placed on funding of projects located in Balochistan.
- The Prime Minister's high-impact initiatives, Daanish Schools & youth related programmes have been adequately budgeted.
- To bring the less developed areas at par with the other parts of the country, Rs 136 billion (14%) have been allocated for AJ&K, GB and Newly Merged Districts of KP.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION (M&E)

Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) serves as a critical mechanism for ensuring the efficient and prudent utilization of public resources while enhancing service delivery. It facilitates the systematic identification of implementation gaps and the timely initiation of corrective actions to improve project performance. A robust M&E framework strengthens institutional oversight, promotes accountability, and supports informed, evidence-based decision-making.

During FY 2025-26, the Ministry evaluated total forty-five (45) projects against the target of forty (40), while it monitored two-hundred and thirty-five (235) projects and seventeen (17) special assigned projects against a target of two hundred and forty (240) projects. During June 2026, the Ministry monitored twenty-four (24) development projects against a target of twenty-four (24) and conducted evaluations of five (05) projects to assess implementation progress and ensure the achievement of planned development outcomes.



OTHER DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES:

Islamabad Capital Territory Governance Reforms

On 11 June 2026, the Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives chaired a consultation on the ICT Governance Model. The meeting sought stakeholder feedback to refine the proposed governance framework.

A consultation with the Pakistan Business Council (PBC) and the Overseas Investors Chamber of Commerce and Industry (OICCI) finalized the Corporate Partnership for National Delivery (CPND) Framework to strengthen PSDP project delivery. The Ministry also approved SOPs for the headhunting process for project staff. In addition, 34 unpaid internships were offered to university students across different Wings and Sections of the Ministry.



HEC Curriculum Review for Future Skills & Emerging Technologies

On 16 June 2026, the HEC was directed to undertake a comprehensive review of university degree programmes and curricula to align higher education with the evolving requirements of Industrial Revolutions 4.0 and 5.0. The initiative aims to modernize academic programmes, enhance industry relevance, promote future-oriented disciplines, and equip graduates with the skills needed for a technology-driven, innovation-led economy in support of the objectives of URAAN Pakistan.



Consultative Engagements for Export Promotion

On 24 June 2026, consultations were initiated with business leaders, exporters, and multinational companies under URAAN Pakistan. The objective was to identify reforms that support export growth. The consultations emphasized industrial competitiveness, productivity, and an enabling business environment to achieve the national export target of US\$60 billion by 2029.



INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENTS

Seminar on Global Governance and Pakistan-China Friendship



On 9 June 2026, a seminar marking 75 years of Pakistan-China friendship highlighted the importance of international cooperation, peaceful dialogue, and effective global governance. The discussions emphasized strengthening Pakistan-China collaboration in media, education, cultural exchanges, and strategic communication. The seminar re-affirmed the shared commitment of both countries to regional peace, development, and mutual prosperity.

Pakistan-Türkiye Knowledge Sharing Program on Agriculture



A Knowledge Sharing Program on Agriculture was held on 18 June 2026 under the chairmanship of Joint Chief Economist (Economic Policy). The session focused on Pakistan-Türkiye cooperation in agriculture, covering Türkiye's agricultural reforms, support mechanisms, risk management and insurance, and production planning system. It also provided an overview of Pakistan's agriculture sector, emphasizing food security, agricultural modernization, climate resilience, agri-technology transfer, and institutional collaboration. The session provided a valuable platform for exchanging best practices and identifying opportunities to strengthen policy collaboration and institutional capacity in the agriculture sector.



Pakistan-Uzbekistan Strategic Cooperation

On 23 June 2026, Pakistan and Uzbekistan held discussions in Islamabad, to further strengthen bilateral cooperation in education, trade, transport, agriculture, and regional connectivity. The meeting also explored opportunities for expanding academic collaboration, enhancing cultural & historical exchanges, improving air connectivity, and promoting greater economic integration.

The meeting also reaffirmed the commitment of both countries to deepen their strategic partnership.



Pakistan-Denmark Cooperation on Water Sector Development

On 23 June 2026, Pakistan and Denmark re-affirmed their commitment to strengthening cooperation in the water sector, with discussions focusing on sustainable water management, climate resilience, public health, and food security. The engagement emphasized knowledge sharing, technical collaboration, research, innovation and investment to support Pakistan's long-term water sector priorities through continued bilateral partnership.



DEVELOPMENT OUTLOOK

As FY 2025-26 concludes, it marks the successful completion of another phase of Pakistan's development journey and provides a stronger foundation for the year ahead. With the commencement of FY 2026-27, the focus will remain on effective implementation of the Annual Plan, prudent resource management, accelerated PSDP execution, and evidence-based policymaking. Continued emphasis on export-led growth, private sector investment, infrastructure development, digital transformation, and climate resilience will support sustainable economic progress. Strengthened institutional coordination, enhanced monitoring and evaluation, and strategic international partnerships will further contribute to achieving the country's development priorities.
